SUMMARY

The Monthly Investment Report transmits to the Board a summary of all investments held by the District as of the end of each month. It has been the District's practice to transmit this report as a Summary of Investments that list all securities held in a spreadsheet format reviewed and signed by the Treasurer. This report represents a revised format that staff has developed and will continue to modify that seeks to provide additional information and context related to the Monthly Investment Report. New features in this report include a narrative of current investment activity, charts showing investment trends, and "Appendix A" that provides definitions for terms and abbreviations used in the Monthly Investment Report.

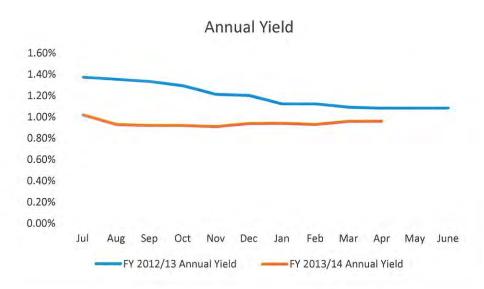

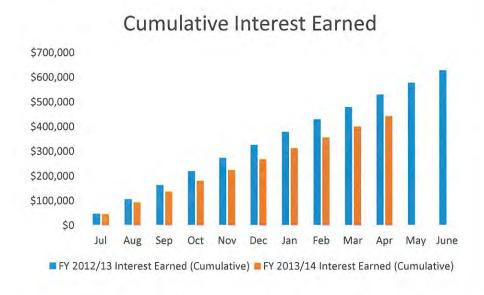
DISCUSSION

The Monthly Investment Report provides an update of the Districts pooled investments, including funds held in the Local Agency Investment Pool (LAIF), direct investments, and investments held for the Refunding Bond reserve, sweep accounts and money market accounts. As of April 30, 2014, the District held \$73,256,642 in its portfolio. The majority of the funds are held in the District's investment accounts that had an April 30 value of \$46,742,995. LAIF held 32.21% of the total invested funds at \$23,595,168. The significant portion of remaining funds were held as required reserves for the Bond Refunding.

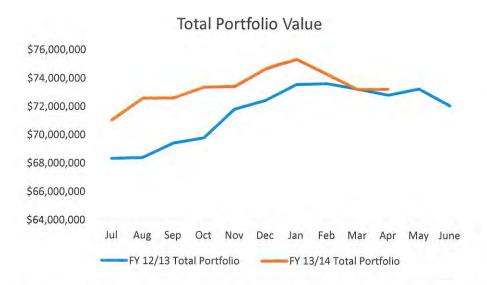
Annual yield for the District's Investment portfolio nudged up to 0.96% in April from a low of 0.91% realized in November 2013. The following chart shows annualized monthly yield over the current and last fiscal years. As the chart shows, yields have largely remained flat since August 2013. Staff does not forecast yields to change significantly for the remainder of the fiscal year.



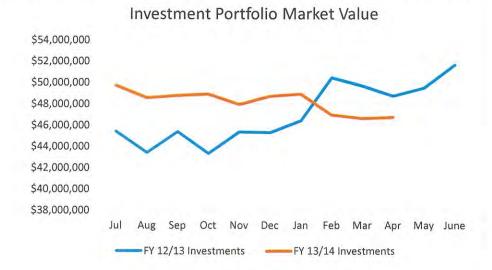
The interested earned from all investments in the portfolio during the current fiscal year has predictably trailed fiscal year 12/13. The following chart shows cumulative interested earned over the previous two fiscal years. Since there is no indication of interest rates increasing through the remainder of the current fiscal year, staff projects that the current trend will continue.

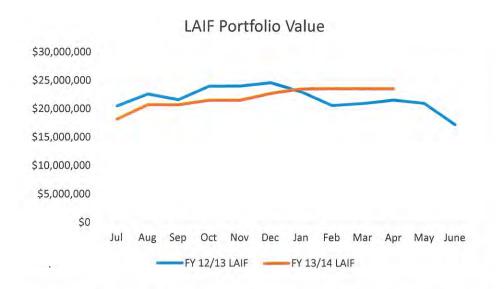


The market value of the portfolio as of April 30, 2014 is 0.6% higher than April 30, 2013. The portfolio typically fluctuates as funding is needed for capital projects. The chart below shows the total portfolio value over time.



On average, the District maintains approximately 30-35% of the portfolio in LAIF and 65-70% in direct investments. The following charts show the value of the District's Investment Portfolio and LAIF. The charts visually show the District's rebalancing of funds to the Investment Portfolio from LAIF during the last half of fiscal year 12/13 to achieve slightly better yields while still maintaining needed liquidity.





The District's Investment Portfolio is detailed on the following pages and included \$3,007,400 in investments that are maturing within six months and \$43,735,595 in securities maturing in more than six months.

General Manager Pedersen reviewed the outline of the workshop and discussed the goals, desired outcomes and proposed next steps. Further, he reviewed an update on progress to accomplish the District's Fiscal Year 2013-2014 Tactical Actions and Activities.

As it relates to the objectives, for objective 2.2, President Caspary requested that staff evaluate the potential effect of the rising elevation of the streambed adjacent to the Tapia Water Reclamation Facility and the potential flood risk. Also President Caspary asked that staff look at the existing land "footprint" for Tapia and the possible need for future land required for facilities to meet new, more stringent regulatory requirements.

For objective 2.6, Director Polan raised the issue of getting the word out with regard to conservation efforts. Additionally, with respect to Objective 3.1, he asked about the means to evaluate the District's financial/investment policies. Answers to these questions were provided by staff.

Following this discussion, President Caspary requested that staff include guidance for field employees when updating the Customer Service Procedure Handbook per Objective 4.1.

In terms of Objective 4.2, there was a brief discussion of web-security and recent concerns with the Heart Bleed Virus.

General Manager Pedersen provided an overview of the District's adopted financial policies. Director Peterson noted that OPEB should be recognized as a debt and pointed out that the Rate Stabilization Fund established with Policy 3 should be used and replenished when necessary. Questions arose with regard to how the budget-based water rates would affect the need and/or use of the Rate Stabilization Fund. Also, there was a question about the definition of the term "reliable revenue sources". Staff agreed to report back with answers to these questions.

For policy 10, Director Polan asked about when the Emergency/Insurance Fund was last utilized with staff agreeing to report back at a later date with an answer.

General Manager Pedersen reviewed the District's Strategic Plan, consisting of seven goals supported by various objectives. Director Peterson noted that the District should update its Strategic Plan every few years.

Director of Finance and Administration Patterson reviewed key budgetary trends and inputs that are being considered for preparation of the Fiscal Year 2014-15 Budget, including: potable water demands, recycled water demands, energy costs, JPA chemical/amendment costs, and personnel costs.

Director of Facilities and Operations Lippman reviewed the draft Infrastructure Investment Plan for Fiscal Year 2014-15 through 2017-18. Director Polan made a comment relative to the definition of climate change v drought. Director Renger asked about the potential effect of an earthquake occurring while the Calabasas Tank Rehabilitation Project is underway with staff responding to the question appropriately. President Caspary requested that staff note in all locations that LADWP will reimburse the JPA for the construction cost of the Woodland Hills Country Club Extension.

Financial Analyst Hamilton reviewed the Fiscal Year 2014-2015 Proposed Preliminary Budget, including: projected working capital balances, potable water expenses, recycled water expenses, sanitation expenses, JPA expenses, internal services expenses, and major capital improvement projects.

Following an extensive discussion on the budget, the Board recessed to a short break at <u>10:29 a.m.</u>, and reconvened at <u>10:33 a.m.</u>

General Manager Pedersen stated that the budget adoption is set up for the first meeting in June.

3. PUBLIC COMMENTS

There were no comments from members of the public.

4. ADJOURNMENT

Seeing no further business to come before the Board, the meeting was duly adjourned at 10:44 p.m. in Memory of Brent Groves.

ITEM 4C

B Legislative and Regulatory Updates

General Manager Pedersen reported on the following issues: Water Resources Reform and Development Act moved out of conference between the House and the Senate and that is very likely that this will now pass the floor of the house and senate and be signed by the President. He stated that one of the main components of the legislation is the Water Infrastructure Finance and Innovation Act and that the District and JPA had both written letters of support and that this is a federal low interest loan program for infrastructure projects related to water. Mr. Pedersen also reported on the Governor's emergency proclamation of January 17 and the issuance of a continued emergency proclamation on April 25; and that this included more specific measures to take as it relates to conservation efforts.

There were no questions from the Board to Mr. Pedersen relative to his report.

6. TREASURER

Treasurer Polan stated that he had a question on page 30 of the report relative to the State Water Resources Control Board/Tapia WRF and that he was not clear as to what that amount of \$1,791.00 was for. General Manager Pedersen stated that this is related to the NPDES permit fee, which is a permitting service fee.

7. BOARD OF DIRECTORS

A Clarification of District Policy for Video Recording Board Meetings.

Approve a policy for the District to vide record all Board meetings, including special Board meetings and workshops.

Director Renger asked if the videographer is available for video recording meetings at odd hours such as early mornings, with Mr. Bigilen stating that he is.

Director Peterson commented that sometimes the Board's special meetings are tours where they take the show on the road so to speak and asked if these also are to be recorded.

Board President Caspary asked Director Steinhardt to address the intent of the policy. Mr. Steinhardt clarified what constitutes a special meeting, which does not include tours.

Director Renger asked if the video recording policy also includes meetings such as when the Board is presenting things to the public such as in the case of the blasting for example, with Director Steinhardt stating that was not a meeting.

<u>Director Polan</u> moved to approve as presented. Said motion was seconded by <u>Director Steinhardt</u> and carried unanimously.

B Clarification of Board's Policy/Procedure for Per Diem Compensation.

Consider clarification to the Board's policy per diem compensation to address the eligibility of travel days and provide staff with feedback on a new, proposed Per Diem Report form.

General Manager Pedersen presented the staff report stating that there are three items covered in this staff report: 1) to clarify eligible events; 2) eligibility of travel days; and 3) proposed per diem report form.

There was a discussion on this topic related to acceptable per diems; and what guidelines ought to be used. Mr. Pedersen spoke about the policies in three other similar agencies which are listed as part of the staff report and which include Calleguas, West Basin Municipal Water District and Three Valleys Municipal Water District; and spoke with specificity as to what these agencies' per diem both dentall.

An extensive discussion ensued relative to this item with the following comments made by directors:

Renger: there should not be per diem for unnecessary items; essentially no per diem for travel only but in support of meals; would not approve per diem for less than 50 miles; if the day is for travel only regardless of whether it is 5 miles or 500 miles Directors should have no per diem; however, he should have his meals taken care of and mileage as well as lodging.

Caspary: if Directors travel the day before the event, there is some lodging involved too, which is a cost to the District.

Polan: feels that it is unreasonable that he is taking a whole day off from other things he could be doing and not be compensated for it; that he does not think it is reasonable that he is not entitled to compensation for the time spent conducting business of the District; he feels it is reasonable to get paid for mileage and food and it should also be reasonable to get paid for one's time spent on District business.

Steinhardt: agrees that a travel day should be paid for; that when a day is taken off work and he receives a per diem of \$200.00, he is essentially losing money that day; and commented that in discussing this with other Directors and General Managers at ACWA, there is not one who does not get paid for a travel day. He proceeded to move that Directors get paid for travel days whether it would be before or after depending on when you get out, with Board President Caspary asking if it was his intent to limit payment on travel days to one either before or after but not both. Mr. Steinhardt stated that he would not put a limit in the event that the Director could not get out that night or if an event such as a committee meeting ran late and that he would not put a limit since the after is a rarity.

Board President Caspary stated that in the unlikely event that a Board member cannot get out because an event is running late; there is nothing to prevent the Director from seeking special consideration of the Board on a case by case basis.

There was a discussion on the provisions contained in the West Basin policy relative to per diems; traveling to an event the day before and returning the day after for the convenience of the member, which will result in anticipated costs to the District in terms of meals, lodging etc. There was also a brief discussion on the logistics of early morning meetings and the issues of traveling early in the morning as opposed to traveling the night before for the Board member to be alert and ready to fully participate in meetings.

<u>Director Steinhardt</u> moved to allow/approve for a travel day the day before and the day after if necessary. <u>Director Polan</u> seconded. Motion carried by the following vote:

C Local Agency Formation Commission: Election of Special District Representative

Select one candidate to serve as the Local Agency Formation Commission Special District representative and authorize the General Manager to execute and return the official voting ballot on behalf of the District no later than 5:00 p.m. on Monday, June 2, 2014.

General Manager Pedersen presented the staff report and stated that there are two candidates: the incumbent Mr. Gladbach and a challenger Mr. Matthews with the Foothill Municipal Water District.

<u>Director Peterson</u> moved to support Jerry Gladbach. Motion seconded by <u>Board President Caspary</u> and carried unanimously.

D California Association of Sanitation Agencies: Adoption of Proposed Bylaws.

Approve repealing the existing bylaws of the California Association of Sanitation Agencies and adopting proposed new bylaws; and authorize the General Manager to execute and return the official voting ballot such that it is received no later than Monday, June 16, 2014.

General Manager Pedersen presented the staff report and stated that the CASA bylaws have not been updated for a long time and this update is intended to meet federal and state legal requirements for such an agency.

<u>Director Peterson</u> moved to approve as presented, seconded by <u>Director Polan</u> and carried unanimously.

8. FACILITIES AND OPERATIONS

A City of Agoura Hills Eminent Domain Actions: Settlement and Release Agreement

Authorize the General Manager to execute the Settlement and Release Agreement between the District and the City of Agoura Hills to dismiss the District from all claims associated with the City's eminent domain actions for the Agoura Road Improvement Project.

The Board concurred that this had been discussed before. <u>Director Renger</u> moved to approve as presented. Motion seconded by <u>Board President Caspary</u> and carried unanimously.

B Barrymore Drive Slope Repair and Pavement Restoration

Waive formal bidding requirements for the Barrymore Drive slope repair and pavement restoration work; authorize the General Manager to approve a purchase order to Toro Enterprises in the amount of \$47,169.00 for the work; and authorize the General Manager to approve an increase to the purchase order amount by up to \$15,000 as a contingency for additional work that may be required based upon field inspection of the work by a geotechnical engineer.

General Manager Pedersen introduced the item stating that this is a repair project that is needed due to a 12" water main break above Solstice Canyon. David Lippman, Director of Facilities and Operations continued the report and graphically showed photographs of the subject area. He briefed the Board on the specific attributes of the area and how they intend to carry out the work; commented that the failure was caused by corrosion due to an original installation defect.

ITEM 4C

Following Mr. Lippman's presentation, there were some questions from the Board to which Mr. Lippman provided answers relative to: cost, bidders, sedimentation in the stream; response time; potential of equipment damaging the road, whether or not we have to declare an emergency to move forward and that this should be part of the motion.

<u>Director Peterson</u> moved to declare this an emergency and waive formal bidding. Motion seconded by <u>Director Renger</u> and carried unanimously.

9. FINANCE AND ADMINISTRATION

A Financial Review: Third Quarter of Fiscal Year 2013-2014

Receive and file the Financial Review for the third quarter of Fiscal Year 2013-2014.

Don Patterson, Director of Finance and Administration presented the staff report indicating that he would focus on a high level summary; he stated that the operating revenues and supplies expenses are exceeding budget and that this has been consistent with the last quarter report; that is due to weather conditions and the increased usage of water in the potable water supply system. Mr. Patterson covered the slides regarding the potable water sales; Las Virgenes Municipal Water District's FY 2013-14 Year to date at March 31; Third quarter revenues v. expenses for potable water; revenue v. expense for recycled water and also revenue v. expenses for sanitation.

Following Mr. Patterson's presentation, there was a brief discussion on the Financial Review and questions from the Board were answered.

<u>Director Polan</u> moved to receive and file as presented. Motion seconded by <u>Director Renger</u> and carried unanimously.

B Velocity Offsite Disaster Recovery for Information Systems: Annual Purchase

Authorize the General Manager to approve an annual purchase order to Velocity in the amount of \$37,418, providing for monthly payments of \$3,114 and a one-time additional payment of \$50.00 for shipment of back-up tapes,

General Manager Pedersen presented the staff report indicating that Velocity is the vendor we use for Business Continuity/Disaster Recovery and what they do is that they replicate our data in real time on their server in the event of a disaster and that our two key systems are customer information system for billing and our financial system JD Edwards, which they can on short notice have it up and running.

Director Renger moved to approve, motion seconded by Director Peterson and carried unanimously.

There were a few questions relative to tapes and the type of security systems Velocity uses.

C Settlement Claims from Pacific Bell and JP Morgan Chase Bank

Approve settlements in the amounts of \$325,000 with JP Morgan Chase and \$32,073 with Pacific Bell for release of all claims associated with the District's May 13, 2013 water main break on Calabasas Road and authorize payment of \$50,000 to the District's insurance carrier for the self-insured retention.

General Manager Pedersen provided a brief summary on the history of these claims.

General Manager Pedersen explained in detail the purpose of the aforementioned resolutions stating that we have an opportunity here to apply for grant funding that is expedited through the recent passing of SB103 and SB104 and the companion bills AB 79 and 80; he commented that these are emergency drought bills which established a reallocation of existing bond funds in the sum of \$687.4 million dollars and out of that amount \$200 million is designated as expedited grant funding for drought relief projects for California. Mr. Pedersen stated that this money is to be allocated through the Integrated Regional Water Management Planning process and that we are part of that process.

Mr. Pedersen explained what these resolutions will do with the first Resolution 05-13-2055 having two actions: 1) to adopt the 2014 Updated Greater Los Angeles County Integrated Regional Water Management Plan; and 2) authorize and direct the General Manager or his designee to vote at the appropriate time to adopt the 2014 Updated GLAC IRWM plan.

With respect to the second resolution, Mr. Pedersen indicated that the actions requested with that resolution are: 1) authorize the General Manager to approve and submit an Integrated Regional Water Management Implementation Grant application to the California Department of Water Resources pursuant to the Safe Drinking Water, Water Quality and Supply, Flood Control, River and Coastal Protection Bond Act of 2006; and 2) authorize and direct the General Manager to prepare the necessary data, conduct investigations, file such application, and execute a grant agreement with the California Department of Water Resources for the development of water-conserving budget-based water rates.

General Manager Pedersen asked Randal Orton, Resource Conservation Manager to brief the Board on the process of the expedited funding through the Integrated Regional Water Management planning process. Mr. Orton made comments relative to the expedited funding and addressed questions from the Board.

(1) MWD ITEM 4C

Director Peterson reported that MWD has a new Chairman of the Board and a new Director from Los Angeles; that in the conservation area they supported a \$2.00 per square foot for taking grass out not for buying plastic grass; reported on the snow that fell in the Colorado River Basin; spoke about the repairs/retrofits in the headquarters building that are proposed which will cost \$25,000,000; and the their radio system is getting a re-do.

Board President Caspary stated that he would like staff to bring back what Met's actions mean in terms of the rebate program that we are informing customers of and the one customer from Calabasas who wanted to be able to put in artificial grass and this Board did not adopt that.

There were no other reports.

(2) Other – None

B Director's Reports on Outside Meetings

Director Renger reported on the AWA meeting specifically on ground water related issues; reported on having attended ACWA in Monterey and stated that he is on the Water Quality Committee, stated that the potable water discharge permitting is being looked at; water bond issue of \$11.4 billion bond, provided a legislative report on several bills and advocacy efforts at the federal and state levels; spoke about water industry trends that there is a group called California Urban Water Conservation Council which came up with a plan to identify which organizations or districts were effective in their conservation efforts and which were not and that the Assembly heard of this and ran with it and subsequently became part of law in BMP 1.4. Mr. Renger commented on other industry trends that are technical related to computing in the "cloud"; meters; and other related trends. Reported on having attended the Hans Doe Breakfast and learned about the Yorba Linda case and related issues.

Director Polan spoke about the need for more water conservation efforts; spoke about the California Urban Water Conservation Council and the provisions in AB1420; and the various meetings he had attended at the conference in Monterey.

Director Steinhardt reported on two items 1) having attended the fraud awareness and prevention program where there was a discussion on the fraud situation at Treasure Island and the consequences resulting thereof; reported on a program related to low-flow water devices such as toilets and that an audit of this program resulted in findings that showed half of the people who did not meet the criteria of the program were the people who benefitted. Spoke about performance audits and whistle-blower programs to prevent these issues from happening; 2) spoke about Region 8, attended the meeting and a subcommittee pulled out of that to discuss the event that Regions 8, 9 and 10 will be holding most likely in October 2014, a portion of it to discuss the Point Loma discharge and how this is going to have to stop and a potential field trip to the desalination plant in Carlsbad.

Board President Caspary reported on the Santa Monica Bay Restoration Commission meeting and that the Executive Director had resigned and announced her retirement to accept another position with another environmental organization.

C General Manager Reports

(1) General Business

Mr. Pedersen reported on the shut-down of the Jensen Plant and how successfully it was executed; thanked staff and Metropolitan for coordinating this effort was executed.

Board on the construction of the 5-Million water tank and that due to the red flag warnings blasting operations have been suspended as a safety measure and will resume as soon as the winds die down. Mr. Pedersen also reported on upcoming items on the calendar that are forthcoming.

D Director's Comments

Director Polan inquired as to whether or not there is something posted on the LV website indicating that the lawsuit was dropped. General Manager Pedersen stated that there is nothing related to the lawsuit being dropped on the website. Director Polan further commented on Governor Brown's declaration which no longer requires people to have their lawns green but yet some HOA's like the Three Springs still have that requirement which means that they are over stepping on a matter of state jurisdiction and that he would like to make it clear to the rest of the water district that this is the case.

Director Renger followed up with Mr. Pedersen, General Manager on the question of what it would cost to run the filtration plant on a stand-by basis as a way of mitigating the delay in getting it on-line. Mr. Pedersen stated that they had done an analysis and evaluated what the cost would be to run the filtration plant in a stand-by mode for 8 months of the year for a period of 50 years assuming the same time period as the life of the reservoir or the tank discounted that at a 4% rate of interest and came up with a cost of \$26,673, 000 to do that which includes operating expenses.

Subject: Update on City of Calabasas Projects: Lost Hills Interchange Improvement and Las

Virgenes Road Widening

SUMMARY:

On January 6, 2014, the JPA Board approved a proposal from AECOM to provide design services for the Lost Hills Overpass Recycled Waterline Relocation Project. AECOM has completed the preliminary design report and 65% construction design. The 65% construction design was submitted to Caltrans for approval along with the City of Calabasas' (City) overpass design. Once approved by Caltrans, the recycled water pipeline relocation plans and specifications will be part of the Lost Hills/101 Overpass bid documents. The City is planning to bid out the project in the second half of 2014.

District staff is also working with the City on the Las Virgenes Scenic Corridor Completion Project between Agoura Road and Lost Hills Road. The project will provide two traffic lanes in each direction, bike lanes, landscaped medians, and continuous sidewalks along the eastern side of the road. District staff requested that the City provide a traffic signal and a long left turn pocket into the Headquarters campus to accommodate left turns for District construction trucks and trailers. A left hand turn pocket into the farm gate north at Meadow Creek will also be provided. The City may need to encroach onto a District owned parcel on the east side of Las Virgenes Road across from Meadow Creek Lane to accommodate the construction of a retaining wall. Meanwhile, Calabasas Blue Development (the development to the north of the headquarter's campus) is also coordinating with the District and the City to widen Las Virgenes Road across its frontage and relocate a 20" potable water main in order to accommodate their proposed development. The project is currently at the 90% design stage, and the City and Calabasas Blue Development would like to start the construction this summer after schools are out on summer break. Staff will give a presentation of the proposed projects at the board meeting.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF LAS VIRGENES MUNICIPAL WATER DISTRICT:

- 1. A general District election is called for November 4, 2014 for the purpose of electing three members to the Board of Directors for the full term of four (4) years to Divisions 2, 3, and 5 pursuant to Administrative Code section 2-2101.
- 2. The Board of Supervisors of the County of Los Angeles is requested pursuant to section 10403 of the Elections Code to consent and agree to conduct the General District election on November 4, 2014, at the same time as the general election.
- 3. The Registrar-Recorder/County Clerk is authorized to canvass the returns of the General District election and the Board of Supervisors is requested to issue instructions to the Registrar-Recorder/County Clerk to take steps necessary for the holding of the election. The District shall pay in full its *pro rata* share of the expenses for the conduct of the election.
- 4. Pursuant to Elections Code section 13307, each candidate for elective office to be voted for at the General District election may prepare a candidate's statement on an appropriate form provided by the Registrar-Recorder/County Clerk. The statement may include the name, age and occupation of the candidate and a brief description of no more than 200 words of the candidate's education and qualifications expressed by the candidate. The statement shall not include party affiliation of the candidate, nor membership or activity in partisan political organizations. The statement shall be filed in the office of the Registrar-Recorder/County Clerk at the time the candidate's nomination papers are filed. The statement may be withdrawn, but not changed, during the period for filing nomination papers and until 5:00 p.m. of the next working day after the close of the nomination period. No candidate shall include additional materials in the sample ballot package.

The Registrar-Recorder/County Clerk shall estimate the total cost of printing, handling, translating, and mailing the candidates' statements filed, pursuant to the Elections Code, and require each candidate filing a statement to pay in advance a *pro rata* share as a condition of having the statement included in the voter's pamphlet. The Clerk shall bill each candidate for costs in excess of the deposit and shall refund within 30 days of the election unused portion of the deposit. The Registrar-Recorder/County Clerk shall provide each candidate or the candidate's representative copy of this Resolution at the time nominating petitions are issued.

5. The General Manager is directed to file a certified copy of this resolution with the Board of Supervisors and the Registrar-Recorder/County Clerk of the County of Los Angeles.

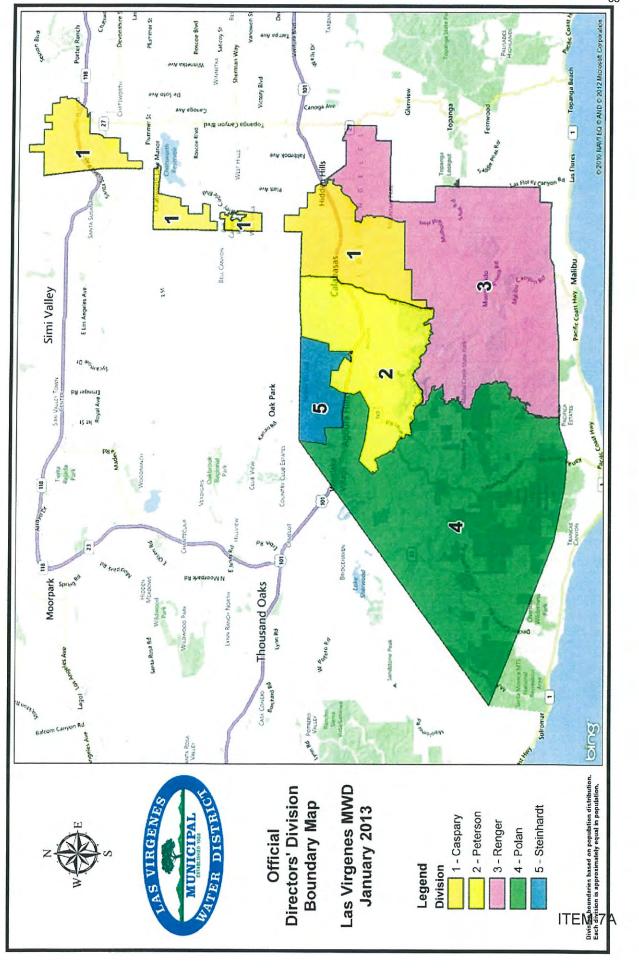

Subject: Potable Water Master Plan Update 2014: Final Draft

SUMMARY:

On March 11, 2014, staff and Kennedy/Jenks Consultants made a presentation to the Board on the draft Potable Water Master Plan Update 2014. Comments provided by the Board were incorporated into the final draft of the document. Completion of the Integrated Master Plan Update is currently underway, and a draft will be presented to the Board in June.

RECOMMENDATION(S):

Provide staff with comments on the final draft of the Potable Water Master Plan Update 2014.

FINANCIAL IMPACT:

There is no financial impact associated with this item.

DISCUSSION:

On December 10, 2012, the Board approved a proposal from Kennedy/Jenks Consultants (KJ) to prepare the Potable Water Master Plan Update 2014. A technical memorandum describing future water demands and the correlation between water use among various customer categories, weather (i.e. evapotranspiration rates and precipitation) and economic factors (i.e. unemployment rates) was presented to the Board on July 23, 2013. Future demand projections were based on land-use planning documents obtained from agencies within the service areas. Future growth was largely based on in-fill and high-density development opportunities such as those for mixed-use properties.

On March 11, 2014, staff and KJ presented the following preliminary review and findings of the draft Potable Water Master Plan 2014:

Water demands are expected to increase by 15 to 24 percent, depending on customer categories, under good economic conditions (unemployment rate of 3.24 percent) and with partial drought recovery from a 2012 baseline. The District's long-range annual water demands are projected to reach approximately 33,750 acre-feet by 2035. Using an updated hydraulic model that links to the District's 2012 billing data, existing and future pipeline deficiencies, storage requirements, and pump station capacities were analyzed.

Based on the results, the Master Plan Update identified no additional backbone system deficiencies upon completion of the current Backbone Improvements Program, including the 5-million-gallon tank, expansion of Westlake Filtration Plant, and modernization of Westlake Pump Station. However, the Master Plan Update identified current and future capital improvements necessary to address non-backbone and legacy system deficiencies, such as water systems in parts of Hidden Hills and Monte Nido areas.

Total needs were identified for \$10,326,100 in current capital improvements and \$32,159,050 in future capital improvements. The timing of the improvements, in particular the need to address existing deficiencies, is based on a variety of factors, including funding availability and the pace of actual YERHSB.

SUMMARY:

On February 25, 2014, the Board approved four pre-qualified contractors for the Calabasas Tank Rehabilitation Project and authorized distribution of the bid documents. A pre-bid job walk was held on April 8, 2014. Four bids were received and opened on April 29, 2014. The low bid was from Blastco, Inc. in the amount of \$2,197,538.00, which is 6% lower than the engineer's estimate of \$2,335,746.00. The following bids were received:

RECOMMENDATION(S):

Award a construction contract to Blastco, Inc. in the amount of \$2,197,538 for the Calabasas Tank Rehabilitation Project, reject all remaining bids upon receipt of duly executed contract documents, and approve an additional appropriation of \$1,780,038 for CIP Project No. 10508 to complete the work.

FINANCIAL IMPACT:

An appropriation of \$976,000 was approved in the adopted Fiscal Year 2012-13 Budget for CIP Project No. 10508, of which \$875,937 is expected to remain unspent at the end of the current fiscal year. An additional appropriation of \$1,780,038 is required to complete the work.

DISCUSSION:

The project consists of removal and replacement of lead-based exterior and coal tar-based interior coatings; structural repairs of rafters and beam connections; replacement of lateral bracing between rafters; and installation of gusset plates around the circumference of the tank to provide improved seismic resistance. Additionally, proposed site improvements include installation of a security fence and access road pavement replacement. Construction is scheduled during the low water demand period of the year between December 2014 and April 2015. Additionally, work will be performed using a 7-day work week and a 12-hour work day.

Shortly after the bids were opened, representatives of the Painters and Allied Trades Compliance
Administrative Trust (PATCAT) met with staff and provided the District with documentation (Exhibit A)
alleging Blastco's violation of prevailing wage and apprenticeship regulations in the past. PATCAT Staff
suggested that Blastco should be deemed a non-responsible bidder and not awarded a construction contract
for the project. Staff forwarded the documents to Blastco and received an explanation (Exhibit BTEM 86

alleged prevailing wage disputes had been settled and that the two violations of apprenticeship regulations were disclosed during the prequalification process. Based on discussions with the District's Legal Counsel, Blastco should not be deemed a non-responsible bidder. Blastco and PATCAT representatives plan to attend the Board meeting to answer questions related to this matter.

In the event that the Board's questions are not answered satisfactorily, staff could be directed to retain labor compliance monitoring services to ensure strict compliance for the proposed construction project. The additional cost of such services would be approximately \$25,000.

On April 15, 2011 a notice was given to Blastco, Inc by the Division of Apprenticeship Standards for their failure to comply with Labor Code 1777.5 resulting in a civil penalty for the amount of \$2,650.00 (Exhibit 1). On October 14, 2011 The Division of Apprenticeship Standards received a check of \$4700.00in full settlement of Notice of Complaint for the work at Rancho California Water District Project 016, D1620, D1625, D1628 (Exhibit 2), On July 17, 2013 the Department of Industrial Relations Division of Labor Standards Enforcement found Blastco Inc in violation of Labor Code 1774 for failure to pay the correct prevailing wage pursuant to the General Prevailing Wage determination of Contra Costa County for the classification of Laborer, Industrial Painters, Operating Engineers which resulted in penalties assessed to a total of \$223,304.60 (Exhibit 3). On July 12, 2013 Blastco Inc again was found in violation for Labor Code Section 1775 for failure to pay the prevailing wage pursuant to determination number ALA-2011-1, C-14-X-2-2011-1, NC-23-102-1-2011-1 and NC-23-63-1-2010-1 for the classification of Industrial Painter, Apprentice Painter, Boilermaker, Carpenter, Laborer, and Operating Engineer which resulted in penalties to a total of \$282,349.00 (Exhibit 4). On January 16, 2014 Division of Labor Standards Enforcement issue settlements for Apprenticeship Violations on the San Diego County Helix Water District Calavo Tank (Exhibit 5), Torrey Pines and Crest Reservoir (Exhibit 6), 657-1 & 657-2 Reservoir Exterior & Interior Coating and Upgrades - Otay Water District (Exhibit 7) and on February 14, 2014 the Division of Labor Standards issued settlement for 1777.5 violations (Exhibit 8).

You should also know that employees of Blastco Inc are suing the company for: Failure to pay wages, overtime pay, minimum wage, prevailing wages and liquidated damages, failure to provide meal periods, failure to authorize and permit rest periods, failure to pay all wages due at the time of termination, failure to furnish timely and accurate wage statements, violation of the California Unfair Competition Law (Exhibit 9).

Due to the consistent failure to comply in the past from this contractor on Public Works projects, we ask that you reconsider not awarding the project to Blastco, Inc. This contractor violated the <u>California Labor Codes under Public Works</u> time and time again; Blastco should be considered a NON-RESPONSIBLE bidder.

Painters and Allied Trades Compliance Administrative Trust, works diligently to insure fairness and compliance by all contractors in the bidding and performance of public works projects and trusts the transparency and fairness of Las Virgenes Municipal Water District.

INTRODUCTION

1. Plaintiffs Alejandro Cabrera, Adrian P. Medina, Jaime Rivera, and Jose Rocha (collectively, "Named Plaintiffs"), bring this action against Defendant Blastco Incorporated, doing business in California as NY Blastco, Inc., and Does I through 10 (collectively, "Defendants" or "BLASTCO"), alleging unfair business practices and violations of the California Labor Code. Named Plaintiffs bring this action individually and as a proposed state-wide class action on behalf of similarly situated current and former employees who have been employed by BLASTCO as hourly, non-exempt, on-site construction employees at job sites including oil refineries, reservoirs, bridges, power plants, acid plants, rock plants, and other facilities within the State of California at any time during the four years preceding the filing of this Complaint and up to the present and until compliance with the law.

- 2. Named Plaintiffs seek class-wide relief under California law for Defendants' common policies and practices of failing to: (a) pay any wages, including the applicable minimum wage, for all hours worked, including but not limited to time spent donning safety equipment at the beginning of a shift and clean-up time at the end of a shift; (b) pay wages in accordance with prevailing wage rates required on public works projects; (c) provide meal periods as mandated by California Labor Code sections 226.7 and 512 and California Industrial Welfare Commission Wage Order 16-2001 ("Wage Order 16"); (d) authorize and permit rest periods as required by California Labor Code section 226.7 and Wage Order 16; (e) provide complete and accurate itemized wage statements as required by California Labor Code section 226, and (f) pay former employees all wages due and owing at the time of separation from employment in violation of California Labor Code sections 201, 202, and 203.
- 3. Named Plaintiffs, suing on behalf of themselves, putative class members, and the general public, seek restitution and injunctive relief under California law for Defendants! unlawful, unfair, and fraudulent business practices which have deprived their employees of their rights under California's labor laws and regulations, in order to reduce its payroll costs and increase profits, in violation of applicable laws. Named Plaintiffs seek recovery of all allowable compensation and other sums for the violations described above, including premium pay for missed meal and rest periods, restitution, restoration of sums owed and property unlawfully withheld, statutory penalties, declaratory and injunctive relief, interest, attorneys' fees, and costs.

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JURISDICTION AND VENUE

- 4. This Court has subject matter jurisdiction over Named Plaintiffs' claims based on, among other statutes, California's Unfair Competition Law, Business and Professions Code section 17200 et seq. ("UCL") and California Labor Code sections 201-203, 226, 226.7, 510-512, 1770, 1771, 1774, 1194, 1194.2 and 1199(c). This Court has personal jurisdiction over the parties because, at all times relevant hereto, Named Plaintiffs were California residents who worked for Defendants in California, and Defendants have systematically and continuously conducted business in the State of California.
- 5. Venue is proper in this Court because California Code of Civil Procedure sections 395 and 395.5, and case law interpreting those sections, provide that if a foreign business entity fails to designate with the office of the California Secretary of State a principal place of business in California, it is subject to being sued in any county in the state that a plaintiff desires. On information and belief, as of the date this Complaint is filed, Defendant BLASTCO is a foreign corporation and has failed to designate a principal place of business in California with the office of the Secretary of State.
- 6. Named Plaintiffs' individual claims are less than \$75,000 each, and the claims of the proposed class total less than \$5,000,000, inclusive of damages, penalties, interest, attorneys' fees, and costs.

THE PARTIES

- 7. Named Plaintiff Alejandro Cabrera is an adult who worked for BLASTCO in California. Named Plaintiff Cabrera was employed by BLASTCO as a journeyman painter on a public works project at the Laytonville Bridge in Laytonville, California, from approximately May 30, 2011 through June 8, 2011. Named Plaintiff Cabrera also worked for BLASTCO as a journeyman painter on a public works project at the Rancho California Water District in Terrecula, California, from approximately January 31, 2011 through May 12, 2011. Both the Laytonville Bridge project and the Rancho California Water District project are public works projects that are subject to the prevailing wage laws.
- 8. Named Plaintiff Adrian P. Medina is an adult who worked for BLASTCO in California, Named Plaintiff Medina was employed by BLASTCO as a journeyman painter on various projects from February 2010 through August 2011. These included public works projects at the Rancho

 California Water District in Temecula, California, and the Las Palmas Reservoir in Fullerton, California, which are public works projects subject to the prevailing wage laws. Named Plaintiff Medina also worked for BLASTCO as a journeyman painter on private jobs at refineries in the cities of Ontario, Wilmington, and Simi Valley, California.

- 9. Named Plaintiff Jaime Rivera is an adult who worked for BLASTCO in California. Named Plaintiff Rivera was employed by BLASTCO as a journeyman painter on a public works project at the Laytonville Bridge in Laytonville, California, from approximately May 30, 2011 through June 8, 2011. Named Plaintiff Rivera also worked for BLASTCO as a journeyman painter on a public works project at the Rancho California Water District in Temecula, California, from approximately January 31, 2011 through May 12, 2011. Both the Laytonville Bridge project and the Rancho California Water District project are public works projects that are subject to the prevailing wage laws.
- 10. Named Plaintiff Jose Rocha is an adult who worked for BLASTCO in California. Named Plaintiff Rocha was employed by BLASTCO as a journeyman painter on a public works project at the Laytonville Bridge in Laytonville, California, from approximately July 11, 2011 through July 23, 2011. Named Plaintiff Rocha also worked for BLASTCO as a journeyman painter at the Rancho California Water District in Temecula, California, from approximately January 17, 2011 through May 10, 2011. Both the Laytonville Bridge project and the Rancho California Water District project are public works projects that are subject to the prevailing wage laws.
- 11. Named Plaintiffs bring this action individually and on behalf of the following class of individuals (the "putative class members"):

All current and former hourly, non-exempt on-site construction employees who performed work for BLASTCO at job sites located within the State of California at any time during the four years preceding the filing of this Complaint and up to the present and until compliance with the law.

12. Defendant BLASTCO is a Delaware corporation doing business throughout California and is a "person" as defined by California Labor Code section 18 and California Business and Professions Code section 17201. In addition, it is an "employer" as that term is used in the California Labor Code and in the California Industrial Welfare Commission's Orders regulating wages, hours, and working conditions.

- 13. Named Plaintiffs are ignorant of the true names and capacities of Defendants sued as Does 1 through 10, inclusive, and therefore sue those Defendants by those fictitious names. Named Plaintiffs will amend this Complaint to allege their true names and capacities when ascertained. Named Plaintiffs are informed and believe and on that ground allege that each of the fictitiously named Defendants is responsible in some manner for the occurrences alleged and that Named Plaintiffs' damages and other losses as alleged are proximately caused by those occurrences.
- 14. Named Plaintiffs are informed and believe and on that ground allege that, at all relevant times. Defendants and each of them, directly or indirectly, or through an agent or any other person, employed and/or exercised control over the wages, hours and/or working conditions of Named Plaintiffs, and that Defendants and each of them were the joint employers of Named Plaintiffs and/or alter egos of each other.

FACTUAL ALLEGATIONS

- 15. BLASTCO provides coating services, including spray painting, floor epoxy application, wax wrapping and general maintenance painting for industrial clients throughout California.
- 16. At all relevant times, Named Plaintiffs were employed by BLASTCO as non-exempt hourly employees in on-site construction occupations as defined by section 2(C) of Wage Order 16, 8 CCR § 11160. During their employment with BLASTCO, Named Plaintiffs typically worked shifts with on-the-clock times of 8 to 10 hours or longer, five to six days per week.
- 17. BLASTCO had a policy and practice of failing to pay Named Plaintiffs and other putative class members for all hours worked by failing to pay them any wages, including the applicable minimum wage, for time spent donning safety equipment at the beginning of their shifts as well as clean-up time at the end of their shifts.
- 18. BLASTCO had a policy and practice of failing to pay Named Plaintiffs and other putative class members working on public works projects the applicable prevailing wage rate required by Labor Code § 1770, et seq.
- 19. During the respective periods in which Named Plaintiffs were employed by BLASTCO, they did not receive a first meal period of at least 30 minutes relieved of all duty as required by Labor Code sections 226.7 and 512 and Wage Order 16, section 10(B), as they were required to spend time

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removing their safety equipment during their meal period. Further, Named Plaintiffs often were required to work shifts of more than 10 hours. When BLASTCO required Named Plaintiffs and other putative class members to work shifts of more than 10 hours, it had a policy and practice of failing to provide them with a second meal period of at least 30 minutes relieved of all duty as required by Labor Code sections 226.7 and 512 and Wage Order 16, § 10(B). Named Plaintiffs allege that they and, on information and belief, other putative class members never waived their right to a second meal period.

- 20. During the respective periods in which Named Plaintiffs were employed by BLASTCO, BLASTCO had a policy and practice of failing to authorize and permit them to take discrete rest periods of at least 10 minutes for every four hours of work performed or major fraction thereof as required by Labor Code § 226.7 and Wage Order 16, § 11(A).
- 21. Labor Code section 226(a) provides that every employer is required, "semimonthly or at the time of each payment of wages," to give each employee an itemized wage statement, including "gross wages earned" and "total hours worked." BLASTCO had a policy and practice of failing to provide complete and accurate itemized wage statements to Named Plaintiffs and other putative class members as required by Labor Code section 226 in that the wage statements provided did not, among other things, include the accurate gross wages earned, the required premium wages earned for missed meal periods, or the accurate total hours worked.
- 22. BLASTCO had a policy and practice of failing to timely pay all accrued wages and other compensation due to putative class members at the time of separation from employment in violation of California Labor Code sections 201, 202, and 203.

CLASS ALLEGATIONS

23. Named Plaintiffs bring this class action pursuant to Code of Civil Procedure section 382, on their own behalf and on behalf of a class of similarly situated persons employed by BLASTCO in the State of California. Specifically, Named Plaintiffs seek to represent a class of all hourly non-exempt on-site construction employees who performed work for BLASTCO at job sites located within the State of California at any time during the four years preceding the filing of this Complaint and up to the present and until compliance with the law. Named Plaintiffs also seek to represent the following subclasses of employees who worked for BLASTCO at job sites within the State of California:

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- a. All hourly non-exempt on-site construction employees who performed work for BLASTCO at any time during the four years preceding the filing of this Complaint and up to the present and until compliance with the law, inclusive, who were not paid any wages, including the applicable minimum wage, for certain hours worked, including but not limited to time spent donning safety equipment at the beginning of the shift as well as clean-up time at the end of the shift;
- b. All hourly non-exempt on-site construction employees who performed work for BLASTCO at any time during the four years preceding the filing of this Complaint and up to the present and until compliance with the law, inclusive, who were paid less than the required prevailing wage for work performed on public works projects;
- c. All hourly non-exempt on-site construction employees who performed work for BLASTCO at any time during the four years preceding the filing of this Complaint and up to the present and until compliance with the law, inclusive, who were not provided all required meal periods;
- d. All hourly non-exempt on-site construction employees who performed work for BLASTCO at any time during the four years preceding the filing of this Complaint and up to the present and until compliance with the law, inclusive, who were not authorized and permitted all required rest periods;
- e. All hourly non-exempt on-site construction employees who performed work for BLASTCO at any time during the four years preceding the filing of this Complaint and up to the present and until compliance with the law, who did not receive complete and accurate wage statements; and
- f. All hourly non-exempt on-site construction employees who performed work for BLASTCO at any time during the three years preceding the filing of this Complaint and up to the present and until compliance with the law, inclusive,

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who were not paid all wages due at the time of separation from employment as required by Labor Code sections 201, 202 and 203.

- 24. The proposed class is estimated to include approximately 75 members. The members of the proposed class and sub-classes are so numerous that joinder of all such persons is impracticable and the disposition of their claims as a class will benefit the parties and the Court. Named Plaintiffs reserve the right under Rule 3.765 of the California Rules of Court to amend or modify the class and sub-class descriptions with greater specificity or further division into additional sub-classes or limitation to particular issues.
- 25. There is a well-defined commonality of interest in the questions of fact and law involving and affecting the proposed class members to be represented by Named Plaintiffs, in that all of these employees have been harmed by Defendants' unlawful practices and policies.
 - 26. Common questions of fact and law involved in this action include the following:
 - (a) Whether Defendants maintain or have maintained common policies or practices that failed to pay putative class members for all hours worked, including but not limited to their time spent donning safety equipment at the beginning of their shift as well as clean-up time at the end of their shift;
 - (b) Whether Defendants maintain or have maintained common policies or practices that failed to pay putative class members less than the required prevailing wage for work performed on public works projects;
 - (c) Whether Defendents maintain or have maintained common policies or practices that adequately provide for meal periods in accordance with the requirements of applicable California law;
 - (d) Whether Defendants fail or have failed to provide required information on wage statements, such as the gross wages earned and total hours worked, in accordance with applicable California law, and whether any wage statements provided were accurate;

- (e) Whether Defendants maintain or have maintained policies or practices that authorize and permit rest periods in accordance with the requirements of applicable California law;
- (f) Whether Defendants fail or have failed to pay all wages due Named Plaintiffs and putative class members at the time of separation from employment in accordance with applicable California law;
- (g) What compensatory damages, injunctive relief, and other equitable relief Named Plaintiffs and putative class members are entitled to receive from Defendants; and
- (h) Whether Defendants' policies and practices constitute unlawful or unfair business practices under California's Unfair Competition Law.
- 27. The claims alleged by Named Plaintiffs herein encompass the challenged practices and common courses of conduct of Defendants and are typical of those claims which could be alleged by any member of the proposed class. Named Plaintiffs' claims arise out of the alleged courses of conduct by Defendants and are based on the same legal theories as the claims of the putative class members. The legal issues as to which California laws are violated by such conduct apply equally to Named Plaintiffs and putative class members. Further, the relief sought by Named Plaintiffs is typical of the relief which would be sought by each member of the proposed class if they were to file individual actions.
- 28. Named Plaintiffs are proper representatives of the proposed class because they will fairly and adequately represent and protect the interests of all putative class members and because there are no known conflicts of interest between Named Plaintiffs and any putative class members.
- 29. The prosecution of separate actions by individual members of the proposed class would create a risk of inconsistent and/or varying adjudications with respect to the individual members of the class, establishing incompatible standards of conduct for Defendants, and resulting in the impairment of putative class members' rights and the disposition of their interests through actions to which they are not parties. This action is manageable as a class action because, compared with other methods such as intervention or the consolidation of individual actions, a class action is fairer and more efficient.

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	30.	Common issues predominate with regard to the claims of Named Plaintiffs and putative
class	member	s in that all of their claims arise out of Defendants' illegal policies and/or practices. A
class	action i	s superior to other available methods for the fair and efficient adjudication of this
contr	oversy b	ecause the putative class members have little or no interest in individually controlling the
prose	cution o	separate actions and individualized litigation would increase the delay and expense to all
partie	s and the	court system.

31. Finally, Named Plaintiffs have retained attorneys who are competent and experienced in class action litigation and they intend to prosecute this action vigorously. Therefore, the interests of putative class members will be fairly and adequately protected by Named Plaintiffs and their counsel.

FIRST CAUSE OF ACTION

FAILURE TO PAY WAGES, OVERTIME PAY, MINIMUM WAGES, PREVAILING WAGES, AND LIQUIDATED DAMAGES (Lab. Code §§ 218.6, 1194 and 1194.2)

32. Named Plaintiffs reallege and incorporate by reference paragraphs 1 through 31, above, as though fully set forth herein.

- 33. Labor Code section 510 and Wage Order 16 require, among other things:
 - (a) One and one-half times the employee's regular rate of pay for all hours worked in excess of eight hours and up to and including 12 hours in any workday, and for the first eight hours worked on the seventh consecutive day of work in a workweek; and
 - (b) Double the employee's regular rate of pay for all hours worked in excess of 12 hours in any workday and for all hours worked in excess of eight hours on the seventh consecutive day of work in a workweek.
- 34. BLASTCO maintains and has maintained a policy and practice that failed to pay Named Plaintiffs and other putative class members for all hours worked by failing to pay them any wages, including applicable minimum wages and overtime pay, for compensable time spent donning safety equipment at the beginning of their shift and clean-up time at the end of their shift.

	35,	In addition, BLASTCO maintains and has maintained a policy and practice that failed to

Inc.	(2002) 10	02 Cal.App.4th 765.

- 36. Named Plaintiffs seek to recover all unpaid wages and overtime pay due to Named Plaintiffs and other putative class members, as well as minimum wages, prevailing wages, and liquidated damages, if appropriate, and interest, pursuant to Labor Code sections 218.6, 1194 and 1194.2.
- 37. Named Plaintiffs seek attorneys' fees and costs under Labor Code section 1194, which provides for a private right of action to recover unpaid minimum wage and overtime compensation, and also provides for the recovery of attorneys' fees and costs.

WHEREFORE, Named Plaintiffs pray for judgment as set forth herein below.

SECOND CAUSE OF ACTION

FAILURE TO PROVIDE MEAL PERIODS

(Lab. Code §§ 226.7 and 512)

- 38. Named Plaintiffs reallege and incorporate by reference paragraphs 1 through 37, above, as though fully set forth herein.
- 39. Labor Code section 512 and Wage Order 16, section 10(C) require employers to provide employees with an off-duty 30-minute meal period for every work period in excess of five hours. If an employee is not provided a meal period in accordance with applicable law, pursuant to Labor Code section 226.7 and Wage Order 16, the employer must pay the employee for work performed during

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those meal periods, plus an additional premium of one hour's wage for each day in which the required meal periods were not provided.

- 40. At all relevant times, BLASTCO was an "employer" of Named Plaintiffs and putative class members within the meaning of Labor Code section 512 and Wage Order 16, section 2(I). At all relevant times, Named Plaintiffs and other putative class members were "employees" of BLASTCO within the meaning of Labor Code section 512 and Wage Order 16, section 2(H). At all relevant times, Named Plaintiffs and other putative class members were employed by BLASTCO in on-site construction occupations, as defined in Wage Order 16, section 2(C).
- 41. As alleged above, BLASTCO required Named Plaintiffs and putative class members to work more than six hours per day. On days when BLASTCO required Named Plaintiffs and putative class members to work more than six hours in a day, BLASTCO had a policy and practice of refusing and/or failing to provide employees a first meal period of not less than 30 minutes, relieved of all duty, as required by Labor Code section 512(a) and Wage Order 16, section 10(B).
- Also, as alleged above, BLASTCO required Named Plaintiffs and other putative class members at various times to work more than 10 hours in a day. On those occasions when Named Plaintiffs and other putative class members worked more than 10 hours in a day, BLASTCO had a policy and practice of refusing and/or failing to provide employees a second meal period of not less than 30 minutes, relieved of all duty, as required by Labor Code section 512(a) and Wage Order 16, section 10(B). Named Plaintiffs allege that they and, on information and belief, other putative class members, never waived their rights to a second meal period.
- 43. Named Plaintiffs and other putative class members have not been provided all meal periods as required by applicable law and seek to recover their unpaid wages for Defendants' violations of the meal period requirements of Labor Code sections 226.7 and 512 and Wage Order 16. As a result of Defendants' unlawful practices, Named Plaintiffs and other putative class members have lost money and property as alleged above, in that they were required to work shifts in excess of five hours without receiving their required meal periods. Further, Named Plaintiffs and other putative class members were not compensated for having been denied such meal periods. The extra hour of pay mandated by Labor Code section 226.7 and Wage Order 16 for missed meal periods is in the nature of wages and is for the

purpose of compensating employees for being required to work through their meal periods. The additional wages to which Named Plaintif's and other putative class members are entitled pursuant to this provision will be discernable from Defendants' records and may be proven at the time of trial.

- 44. BLASTCO's violations of Labor Code sections 226.7 and 512 and Wage Order 16 as alleged above are ongoing and will continue unless and until this Court enters an injunction barring those violations.
- 45. Named Plaintiffs are entitled to an award of attorneys' fees and costs of suit incurred in bringing this action pursuant to Labor Code section 1194 and Code of Civil Procedure section 1021.5.

WHEREFORE, Named Plaintiffs pray for judgment as set forth herein below.

THIRD CAUSE OF ACTION

FAILURE TO AUTHORIZE AND PERMIT REST PERIODS

(Lab. Code § 226.7)

- 46. Named Plaintiffs reallege and incorporate by reference paragraphs 1 through 45, above, as though fully set forth herein.
- 47. As alleged above, BLASTCO required Named Plaintiffs and putative class members to work more than 8 to 10 hours in a single day. For each work week within the four years preceding the filing of this Complaint, BLASTCO has failed to authorize and permit an off-duty 10-minute rest period for every four hours of work, in violation of California Labor Code § 226.7 and Wage Order No. 16-2001 § 11(A). Named Plaintiffs allege that they and, on information and belief, putative class members did not waive their rights to their rest periods.
- 48. Defendants' practice of failing to authorize and permit employees rest periods of not less than 10 minutes for every four hours of work or major fraction thereof, and of requiring employees to work through those rest periods, violates Labor Code § 226.7 and Wage Order 16, § 11(A). Named Plaintiffs and putative class members lost money as a direct result of BLASTCO's unlawful practices. Named Plaintiffs and putative class members are entitled to one hour of pay at their regular rate of pay for each work day in which they were not authorized and permitted an off-duty, 10-minute rest period every four hours of work. Because the records of hours and days of work are in Defendants' custody and control, Plaintiffs are not able to liquidate damages at this time.

- 49. The Defendants' conduct, as alleged above, is unlawful under California law, is continuing, is capable of repetition, and will continue unless restrained and enjoined by the Court. Named Plaintiffs and putative class members have no plain, speedy and adequate remedy at law to redress this continuing unlawful conduct.
- 50. Plaintiffs are entitled to an award Named Plaintiffs are entitled to an award of attorneys' fees and costs and expenses incurred in this action under Labor Code §§ 218.5, 1194 and Code of Civil Procedure § 1021.5.

WHEREFORE, Named Plaintiffs pray for judgment as set forth herein below.

FOURTH CAUSE OF ACTION

FAILURE TO PAY ALL WAGES DUE AT THE TIME OF SEPARATION FROM EMPLOYMENT (Lab. Code §§ 201-203)

- 51. Named Plaintiffs reallege and incorporate by reference paragraphs 1 through 50, above, as though fully set forth herein
- 52. Labor Code sections 201 and 202 require an employer to pay its employees all wages due within certain specified time periods. Labor Code section 203 provides that if an employer willfully fails to pay such wages when due, the employer must continue to pay the employees' daily wages until the back wages are paid in full or an action is commenced, up to a maximum of 30 days' wages.
- 53. Named Plaintiffs and other putntive class members whose employment ended at any time the during the three years preceding the filing of this Complaint and up through the present and until compliance with the law are entitled to all of their unpaid wages, including their premium wages for missed meal periods. To date, they have not received such compensation and, in most cases, more than 30 days have passed since putative class members left BLASTCO'S employ. As a consequence of BLASTCO'S willful failure to timely pay all wages due at the time of separation from employment, putative class members are entitled to 30 days' wages, together with interest, pursuant to Labor Code section 203.
- 54. Named Plaintiffs are entitled to an award of attorneys' fees and costs of suit incurred in bringing this action pursuant to Code of Civil Procedure § 1021.5.

WHEREFORE, Named Plaintiffs pray for judgment as set forth herein below

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FIFTH CAUSE OF ACTION

FAILURE TO PROVIDE COMPLETE AND ACCURATE WAGE STATEMENTS

(Lab. Code §§ 226 and 226.3)

- 55. Named Plaintiffs reallege and incorporate by reference paragraphs 1 through 54, above, as though fully set forth herein.
- Named Plaintiffs are informed and believe that, at all relevant times, Defendants knowingly and intentionally failed to furnish and continue to knowingly and intentionally fail to furnish Named Plaintiffs and other putative class members with complete and accurate itemized statements, as required by Labor Code section 226(a). The wage statements, among other things, failed to accurately provide the gross wages earned, the required premium wages earned for missed meal periods, or the total hours worked by each employee, as required by Labor Code section 226(a)(1).
- 57. As a result of Defendants' conduct as alleged above, Named Plaintiffs and other putative class members have been injured because they have had to or would have to reconstruct their pay records in order to verify whether they have been paid correctly. Under Labor Code section 226(e), Named Plaintiffs and other putative class members are entitled to recover the greater of actual damages or \$50 for the initial pay period in which a violation occurred and \$100 for each subsequent pay period in which Defendants failed to comply with the statute, up to a maximum of \$4,000 per employee.
- 58. Defendants' conduct, as alleged above, is unlawful under California law, is continuing, is capable of repetition, and will continue unless restrained and enjoined by the Court. Named Plaintiffs and other putative class members have no plain, speedy, or adequate remedy at law to redress this continuing unlawful conduct. Accordingly, Named Plaintiffs are entitled to appropriate injunctive relief on behalf of themselves and the proposed class.
- 59. Named Plaintiffs are entitled to an award of their reasonable attorneys' fees and costs, pursuant to, among other authorities, Labor Code sections 226(e) and 226(g).

WHEREFORE, Named Plaintiffs pray for judgment as set forth herein below.

FIRST AMENDED CLASS ACTION COMPLAINT

SIXTH CAUSE OF ACTION

UNFAIR BUSINESS PRACTICES AND VIOLATION OF THE UNFAIR COMPETITION LAW

(Bus. & Prof. Code § 17200 et seq.)

- 60. Named Plaintiffs reallege and incorporate by reference paragraphs 1 through 59, above, as though fully set forth herein.
- 61. California's Unfair Competition Law, Business and Professions Code section 17200 et seeq., defines unfair competition to include any unlawful, unfair, or fraudulent business act or practice. The UCL "borrows violations" from other statutes and authorizes any person who has suffered injury in fact and who has lost money or property as a result of such unfair business practices to bring an action for relief under the statute. The UCL also provides that a court may enjoin acts of unfair competition, issue declaratory and other equitable relief, and order restitution of money or property acquired by means of such unfair competition.
- 62. Beginning at an exact date unknown to Named Plaintiffs, but since at least the four years preceding the filing of this Complaint and up to the present, BLASTCO has committed unlawful acts and practices as defined by California Business and Professions Code §§ 17200, et seq. Defendants have engaged in unlawful and unfair business practices including, but not limited to, violations of:
 - (a) Labor Code § 1194 (failure to pay all wages, including overtime and minimum wage);
 - (b) Labor Code §§ 1770, 1771, and 1774 (failure to pay prevailing wages);
 - (c) Labor Code §§ 226.7 and 512 (failure to provide meal and rest periods);
 - (d) Labor Code §§ 201-203 (failure to pay all wages at time of termination);
 - (e) Labor Code § 226 (failure to provide itemized wage statements); and
 - (f) Wage Order No. 16.
- 63. Defendants' violations of these laws, as well as violations of Labor Code sections 201, 202, 203, and 226, for which only injunctive relief and not restitution may be sought, serve as unlawful predicate acts that resulted in economic harm and injury to Named Plaintiffs and other putative class members for purposes of the UCL and the remedies provided therein. As a direct and proximate result of the aforementioned unfair business practices, Defendants have received and

continue to hold ill-gotten gains belonging to Named Plaintiffs and other putative class members, and Defendants have profited in that amount from their unlawful practices.

- 64. Business and Professions Code section 17203 provides that the Court may restore to any person in interest any money or property which may have been acquired by means of unfair competition and order restitution by Defendants to Named Plaintiffs and other putative class members for the practices alleged in this complaint. Named Plaintiffs and other putative class members are entitled, pursuant to Business and Professions Code sections 17203 and 17208, to restitution and restoration of all wages unlawfully withheld during the four years preceding the filing of this Complaint, up through the present and until the violations have been corrected, together with all civil penalties owed in connection with those violations. Named Plaintiffs will, upon leave of the Court, amend this Complaint to state those amounts when they are ascertained.
- Named Plaintiffs' success in this action will enforce important rights affecting the public interest and, in that regard, they sue individually and on behalf of other similarly situated employees of Defendants. Named Plaintiffs seek and are entitled to unpaid wages, injunctive relief, and any other relief to which they are entitled under the UCL.
- 66. Defendants' violations of the UCL are ongoing and will continue until and unless this Court enters an injunction barring such violations. Named Plaintiffs therefore seek damages and injunctive relief pursuant to Business and Professions Code section 17203.
- Named Plaintiffs are entitled to an award of attorneys' fees and costs of suit incurred in bringing this action pursuant to Code of Civil Procedure section 1021.5.

WHEREFORE, Named Plaintiffs pray for judgment as set forth herein below.

PRAYER FOR RELIEF

Named Plaintiffs pray for relief as follows:

Dear Mr. Caspary:

I am writing in response to a letter from Ramon Lopez, a "case investigator" for the Painters and Allied Trades Compliance Administrative Trust ("PATCAT") which is improperly attempting to challenge the status of Biastco, Inc. ("Biastco") as a non-responsible bidder. I would like to address three specific points.

First, according to case law as cited below, Blastco is, in fact, a responsible bidder and, as the lowest responsible bidder on the project, Blastco is legally entitled an award of the Las Virgenes Municipal Water District contract. Second, not only does PATCAT misrepresent the nature and extent of Blastco's purported "violations," but most of these complaints were self-servingly filed by PATCAT to paint Blastco in a poor light. Please note that all of PATCAT's delineated "violations" were settled for nominal amounts, i.e., less than 10 cents on the dollar, and Blastco has never been denied a public contract because of them. Third, PATCAT lacks standing to protest Blastco's bid. PATCAT's sole purpose is to protest potential contract awards to non-union contractors. Given these facts, I urge the Board to confirm the award of the contract to Blastco.

Blastco is a Responsible Bidder

According to City of Inglewood-L.A. County Civic Center Auth. v. Superior Court (1972) 7 Cal.3d 861, 867: "[A] contract must be awarded to the lowest bidder unless it is found that he is not responsible, i.e., not qualified to do the particular work under consideration."



Blastco is a T.F. Warren Group company.

MCM Construction, Inc. v. City and County of San Francisco (1998) 66 Cal.App.4th 359, 368 concurs that "public entities are required to...award the contract to the lowest responsible bidder," and defines a "responsible bidder" is one that "can perform the contract as promised."

Blastco was one of only four contractors that were prequalified to work on this project. Blastco has been licensed as a Class C33 painting contractor since 1999, and has held a Class A engineering contractor's license since 2007.

Blastco is properly licensed and has the experience required to complete this project. There is no basis for a determination that Blastco is somehow non-responsible.

PATCAT Has Misrepresented the Nature and Extent of Blastco's Purported "Violations"

PATCAT's sole purpose is to protest the award of public works contracts to non-union contractors. As such, six of the nine purported "violations" cited by PATCAT arose as the direct result of complaints filed by PATCAT. Rather than resorting to costly litigation, Blastco chose to settle those complaints for nominal amounts. The six PATCAT generated matters were:

- April 15, 2011, Las Paimas 3b Reservoir, Fullerton, DAS Complaint #2010-0436, which was settled for the nominal amount of \$2,650.
- October 14, 2011, Rancho California Water District Project D16, D1620, D1625, D1628, DAS Complaint #2011-0429, which was settled for the nominal amount of \$4,700.
- January 16, 2014, San Diego County Helix Water District Calvo Tank, DLSE #40-33994-517, which
 was settled for the nominal amount of \$5,760.
- January 16, 2014, Torrey Pines and Crest Reservoir, DAS#40-33988-517, which was settled for the nominal amount of \$4,760.00.
- January 16, 2014, 657-1 & 657-2 Otay Water District, Reservoir Exterior & Interior Coating Upgrades, which was settled for the nominal amount of \$16,720.
- * February 14, 2014, Centinela State Prison Water Tank, DAS #44-34021-517, which was settled for the nominal amount of \$5,200.

Further, PATCAT has misrepresented the extent of two purported violations that arose from Blastco's work for the East Bay Municipal Utilities District. The District's audit initially did not include amounts Blastco paid into a Contractor's Fringe Benefit Trust. When the District conducted a follow up audit, the purported Wage and Penalty Assessment of \$223,304.60 was reduced to \$21,136.34. Similarly, the purported Wage and Penalty assessment of \$282,349.82 was reduced to \$6,908.85.

Finally, although there is a "class action" lawsuit pending against Blastco in Los Angeles County, case number BC490519, the case is in the discovery phase, no class has been certified, and Blastco has not been found liable for any Labor Code violations.

In sum, none of the purported "violations" cited by PATCAT has any merit and may not be used for the basis of a determination that Blastco is not a responsible bidder.

PATCAT Lacks Standing to Protest the Award of a contract to Blastco

PATCAT is not a licensed contractor and did not bid on this project. In fact, PATCAT is organized as a private trust, rather than as a corporation, partnership or limited liability company, in order to conceal its ownership and management.

As PATCAT is not a contractor and did not bid on the project, it lacks standing to protest the award of a contract to Blastco. *Monterey Mechanical Co. v. Sacramento Regianal County Sanitation Dist.* (1996) 44 Cal.App.4th 1391, 1414 fn. 12.

In sum, PATCAT was organized as a private trust in order to hide its management and to avoid the handbilling restrictions imposed on unions by the National Labor Relations Act. Although it lacks standing to do so, PATCAT routinely protests award of public contracts to non-union contractors and files frivolous complaints against those contractors throughout the course of their performance on public projects. Those contractors are forced to litigate the complaints at great cost or to settle them for nominal amounts. PATCAT then uses the nominal settlements as "evidence" that the contractor is non-responsible when the contractor is bidding on subsequent projects. This is exactly what PATCAT did to Blastco.

The Board should disregard the protest filed by PATCAT and award the project to Biastco as the lowest responsible bidder.

Subject: Restrictions on the Use of Turf Grass in Landscaping

SUMMARY:

On March 11, 2014, Director Len Polan requested a future agenda item regarding potential means to better regulate planting of turf grass within the District's service area, specifically with respect to restrictions on the conversion of existing landscaping to turf. Staff research yielded no examples of such restrictions in California

The California Updated Model Water Efficiency Ordinance (AB 1881) sets a minimum water use efficiency standard but does not limit the amount of landscape area that can be irrigated. Cities and the counties were required to adopt and enforce the model ordinance or its equivalent in 2009.

Currently, the only District conservation measure that specifically prohibits re-planting of turf grass is the Mow-No-Mow Program as customers are required to sign an agreement to abandon turf in specified areas of their properties for a period of at least five years in exchange for the financial incentives.

DISCUSSION:

In general, water agencies have substantial authority to regulate water use to reduce waste, especially during drought and other water shortage emergencies[1]. However, even during drought, water agencies have very limited authority to dictate plant landscaping choices on private property, especially for existing homes. Exceptions are for new development or renovation of existing landscaping, which must – in theory – follow state law on water conservation in landscaping, if the affected area exceeds specified square footage thresholds[2].

Even where such ordinances prohibit turf, prohibitions are limited to specific situations where turf may not be appropriate for reasons unrelated to high water use. For example, to prevent urban runoff, the Updated Model Water Efficiency Ordinance prohibits turf on slopes greater than 25% when the slope toe is adjacent to impermeable hardscape. However, in general, even state and local water efficiency ordinances do not dictate plant landscaping choices. Indeed, city and county landscape ordinances under the law cannot include conditions that have the effect of prohibiting low-water use plants as a group. Instead, the law focuses on establishing *Maximum Allowable Water Allocations* (MAWA) that limit irrigation to less than 80 percent of plant reference evapotranspiration (ETo).

In contrast to public agencies, historically, there have been no limitations on the ability of Homeowners Associations (HOAs) and other Common Interest Developments (CIDs) to *require* their members to install and maintain minimum lawn sizes. Homeowners within these HOAs can even be fined or otherwise penalized if they abandon their lawns or do not maintain minimum lawn sizes, which can be set as high as 70 percent of the total front yard landscaped area and specify required turf seed types[3].

This situation has changed somewhat during the current drought emergency, at least with respect to HOA/CID rules that dictate plant landscaping choices. On April 25th, the Governor signed a Prophanting of

a Continued State of Emergency that included prohibiting HOAs and other CIDs from fining residents who take steps to conserve water in violation of HOA rules, if such measures are identified in the Proclamation (e.g. irrigation limitations) or adopted by a public agency or private water company[4].

In this regard, both lawn replacement and reduced irrigation are clearly identified as conservation measures supported by the District[5]. So, while the District may not have legal authority to require lawn abandonment or prohibit the planting of turf on private property, District customers can voluntarily implement any of the water conservation measures supported by the District without fear of fines or other penalties called for in their HOA governing covenants. However, there are reports that many HOAs have simply moved such restrictions out of their governing documents to HOA landscape committees, which simply do not approve residential lawn removal plans. Proposed AB 2104 seeks to amend the Davis-Stirling CID Development Act to try to close deliberately narrow interpretations of the law such as those described.

Looking beyond California, the City of Las Vegas and other Nevada municipalities do restrict the use of turf in new developments and in re-landscaping of existing developments. Turf is not prohibited *per se*, but rather is limited to various percentages and acreages depending on the city, property type and land use zone[6]. However, these restrictions rely on Nevada state zoning laws, which provide local jurisdictions with unusual latitude in dictating land use practices relative to those in California.

Some municipalities in Arizona have restrictions on the use of turf similar to those in Nevada, while others apparently had such restrictions but have since revised them to allow turf so long as specified outdoor water use limits are met. The City of Albuquerque's Water Conservation Landscaping and Water Waste Ordinance, for example, originally limited turf to 20 percent of the total landscaped area on all city-owned housing and all non-city owned properties other than golf courses and single family residences[7]. However, this requirement was modified by resolution when the City adopted its current Long-Term Water Conservation Strategy. Of potential relevance to the District are the City's water reduction goals, including parcel-specific reduction goals (i.e. water budgets) for all customers, with both indoor and summer outdoor use reduction targets of 33 percent and 25 percent, respectively.

Another, less contested avenue available to water agencies seeking to limit the use of irrigated turf is to create customer incentives for water conservation that are contingent on lawn abandonment, such as the District's current Mow-No-Mow Program. This program currently provides \$1 per square foot, recently increased to \$2 per square foot by Metropolitan Water District of Southern California, for lawn removed up to \$2,500. To date, District customers participating in this program have removed over an acre of lawn and have signed agreements with the District to not re-install turf for at least five years. Some examples of similar programs in other western states are shown below.

Examples of Incentive-Style Turf Removal Programs in other States.[8]

Location	Description of Incentive
Albuquerque Bernalillo County Water Utility Authority, New Mexico	Water-bill credit of up to 75 cents a square foot for converting landscape designated as "high water use" — such as Kentucky bluegrass and sheep fescue — to lower-water-use plantings. Plus, 25% off the cost of renting equipment for grass removal.
Southern Nevada Water Authority	Rebate of \$1 to \$1.50 per square foot of grass removed and replaced with desert landscaping.
City of Chandler, Arizona	\$200 to \$600 rebate for replacing turf areas with "non-grass," low-water-use, drought-tolerant plants.
San Antonio Water System, Texas	\$100 gift certificate to nursery for, among other things, "having no more than 50% of the landscape planted in turf" (only Bermuda, buffalo or zoysia varieties — no St. Augustine). Additional water bill credit of \$50 to \$300 for low

water usage.

In summary, staff could not find examples in California where public water agencies had adopted prohibitions on the use of turf when homeowners redo their landscaping. Even prohibitions on turf in new developments were not absolute, but instead consisted of specified "not-to-exceed" percentages of turf in new landscaping. Voluntary incentive programs that include turf restrictions are one alternative to regulatory prohibitions on turf installation.

- [1] A large body of law (both statutory and case law) follows from the State Constitutional prohibition on water waste (Article X, Section 2), and public water districts have generally been supported by the courts in their efforts to reduce inefficient water use and waste.
- [2] Public landscapes and private development projects with at least 2,500 square feet of landscape area are subject to the ordinance. The trigger for homeowner-installed projects is 5,000 square feet.

- [4] Order No. 4 in the Governor's Declaration reads as follows: "4. Homeowners Associations (commonly known as HOAs) have reportedly fined or threatened to fine homeowners who comply with water conservation measures adopted by a public agency or private water company. To prevent this practice, pursuant to Government Code section 8567, I order that any provision of the governing document, architectural or landscaping guidelines, or policies of a common interest development will be void and unenforceable to the extent it has the effect of prohibiting compliance with the water-saving measures contained in this directive, or any conservation measure adopted by a public agency or private water company, any provision of Division 4, Part 5 (commencing with section 4000) of the Civil Code notwithstanding."
